

TRURO—PAYS DE MORLAIX VISIT. The Truro Twinners Visit Morlaix

JULY 10TH—14TH 2008

Some twentyseven Twinners from Truro set off to Morlaix to spend the weekend with their Breton hosts, to experience a wealth of typical Breton culture and hospitality.

After the Thursday night's arrival they were taken through a hectic itinerary of visits—to a food processing factory, art exhibitions, market, Abbaye du Relec at Plouneour Menez and finally to experience the Fête Maritime Internationale at Brest.

In between visits they were invited to a dinner held in their honour at Plouezoch at which the Bretons sang traditional songs. Not to be outdone the Truro contingent sang Cornish songs, and were proud to have three soloists among their midst—Barrie Anthony, Mike Polkinghorne, Lilian Polkinghorne, and Val Jewell who gave wonderful renditions of 'The White Rose' and 'Lamorna'.

After the delights of Morlaix town market to see and buy local food, a formal reception was held at Plourin, a town which was included in the charter of Truro-Morlaix Twinning Association in 2006.

Plourin, alongside four other towns, joined the Association and the Truro—Pays de Morlaix Twinning Association was formed. It was the first time that Mayor of Plourin, Monsieur Jaques Brigant, had met Deputy Mayor Roz Cox and Truro Twinners.

Following a picnic Breton style the Truro and French Twinners visited the 12th Century L'Abbaye du Relec. After thirty years the abbey is still only partially restored. Currently the Abbey is being used for musical recitals and concerts.

The highlight of this year's trip was the visit to the Brest Maritime International Festival. 2000 boats, 15000 sailors from 25 countries ensured that the Twinners had plenty to see and do. There was music on every corner, bands marching through the streets, and stalls from exotic countries selling their produce.

Twinners were delighted and proud to see boats from Cornwall. 'Happy Return'. A 1904 lugger from Penzance owned by the 'Mounts Bay lugger Association' was spotted and 'Whim', a 1905 Auric sloop from Falmouth, was listed in the Centennials section of boats attending.

Everyone returned home all the more enthusiastic for their visit to Morlaix. Their next visit is at Easter next year to celebrate the 30th Anniversary of the Truro-Pays de Morlaix Twinning Association. Truro Twinners have already started planning for the Breton's visit 2009 and hope to have a week of celebration in August.

Juliette Binoche leads a fantastic ensemble cast as one of three distant adult siblings who must decide how to deal with their recently deceased mother's estate, including a valuable collection of art. Writer-director Assayas weaves the subtle parallels which emerge between the lives of these family members in a film which also examines the role and value of cultural legacy and the erosion of the past. Summer Hours is a deeply affecting and beautifully observed exploration of generational change, loss and ultimate renewal.

At the Mediterranean port of Sète, divorced 60-year old Slimane faces losing his shipyard. Turning round his broken family situation and feelings of despondency, he ambitiously takes over a wrecked tug with the dream of setting up his own port-side restaurant, eagerly supported by his enthusiastic daughter Rym, and with his ex-wife Souad doing the cooking - including her speciality, the fish couscous of the title. The failure or success of Slimane's dream provides the drama of this warm, engaging ensemble piece which reaches the UK garlanded with European prizes and accolades. It shows a keen humanist vision of the cultural complexity in contemporary France.

Our latest book review: Reviewer Barrie Anthony (Vice-Chairman of TMTA)

DISCOVERING THE HISTORY OF BRITTANY. Author Wendy Mewes, Published by Red Dog books at £8.99

This curious little book I won at a City Hall raffle.

With a minor ailment and a sleepless night I reluctantly picked on this book to stop 'the mind wagging the dog'. It starts at 5000 BC, leads the reader chronologically to the late 1990's, the precise details accurately listing the inhabitants, claimants and users of this region of France that we know today as Brittany.

It is not as dry as it at first seems, and is full of fascinating and interesting events and dramas regarding the control, development and restructuring of this wonderful corner of France. It lays out and unfolds the complex specifics of the occupiers in a quite readable way and goes some way to explain the politics and power-plays the Bretons have had to endure (and had thrust upon them).

Not a novel, full of bare facts, so little account or background to some of the more remarkable events. It has some illustrations but you have to read the text to obtain any explanation.

Recommended to all seekers of facts or for research.
